The idea of a **'MOOT COURT'** is to give students the opportunity to **develop their skills as ADVOCATES** by arguing a case under conditions **that simulate actual court proceedings**.



The number of international moot court competitions is growing but the African Moot Court Competition is unique and special.

LONGEST-RUNNING MOOT COURT IN AFRICA

The African Human Rights Moot Court Competition 30 has taken place every year – without interruption – for

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30 YEARS
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from 1992 to 2021



The moot court is hosted annually by the **Centre for Human Rights**, University of Pretoria and **another African law faculty**.

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CONTRIBUTES TO TRANSFORMING LEGAL EDUCATION IN AFRICAN LAW SCHOOLS



Generations of young African lawyers have been introduced to the regional human rights system and the potential of the African Court on Human and Peoples' Rights.

INSPIRE AFRICAN LAW FACULTIES Law faculties across the continent have been inspired to institutionalise teaching on the African human rights system into their curricula.



The final round of the Moot Court has included:

- Sitting and past Judges of the African Court on Human and Peoples' Rights
- Members of the African Commission on Human and Peoples' Rights
- Members of the African Committee of Experts on the Rights and Welfare of the Child
- The Chief Justice of the host country
- Other internationally-recognised human rights experts

THE AFRICAN HUMAN RIGHTS MOOT COURT COMPETITION **WORK** FOR HUMAN HAS INSPIRED GENERATIONS OF YOUNG AFRICAN LAWYERS TO RIGHTS

A number of participants have subsequently graduated from the **Masters in Human Rights and Democratisation in African** offered by the Centre for Human Rights.



Other participants have taken up positions with the African Commission on Human and Peoples' Rights and the African Court on Human and Peoples' Rights, or became human rights lawyers and human rights activists working across the continent.

THE AFRICAN MOOT HAS REACHED MANY THOUSANDS OF AFRICAN LAW STUDENTS

Within each of the participating law faculties and schools, the competition starts with **internal knockout rounds** to select the **best 2 students** to represent the university.

About **3,200 students** have participated in the final rounds of the competition over the years.

An **estimation of over 10,000 students** have participated in their faculties' internal selection rounds over the years.
